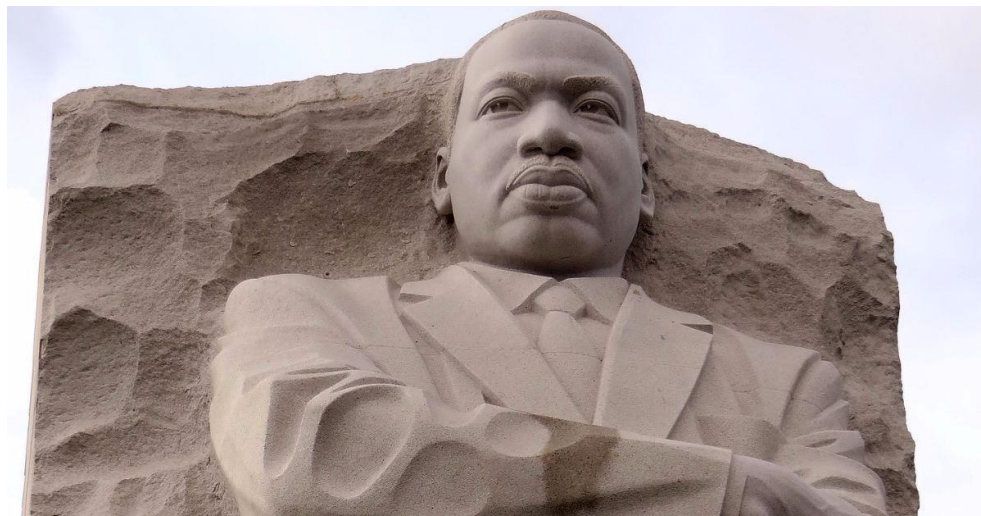

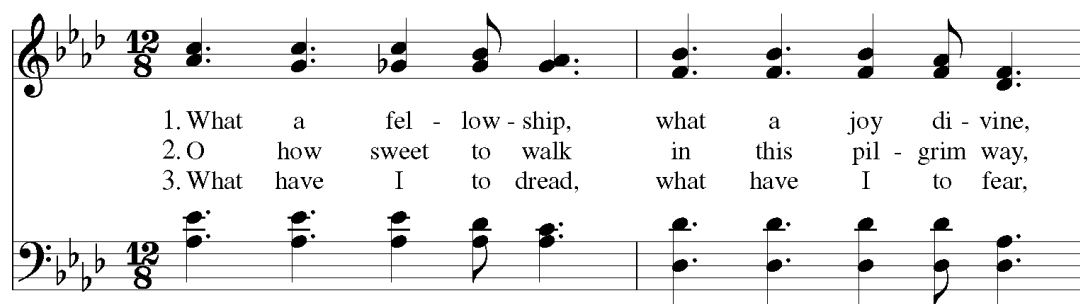
Spiritual Communion Prayer, adapted from the Prayer Book for Armed Services

A spiritual communion is a personal devotional that anyone can pray at any time to express their desire to receive Holy Communion at that moment, but in which circumstances impede them from actually receiving Holy Communion. The leader invites the following prayer to be said by all:

In union, O Lord, with your faithful people at every altar of your Church, where the Holy Eucharist is now being celebrated, we desire to offer to you praise and thanksgiving. We remember your death, Lord Christ; we proclaim your resurrection; we await your coming in glory. Since we cannot receive you now in the Sacrament of your Body and Blood, we beseech you to come spiritually into our hearts. Cleanse and strengthen us with your grace, Lord Jesus, and let us never be separated from you. May we live in you, and you in us, in this life and in the life to come. Amen.

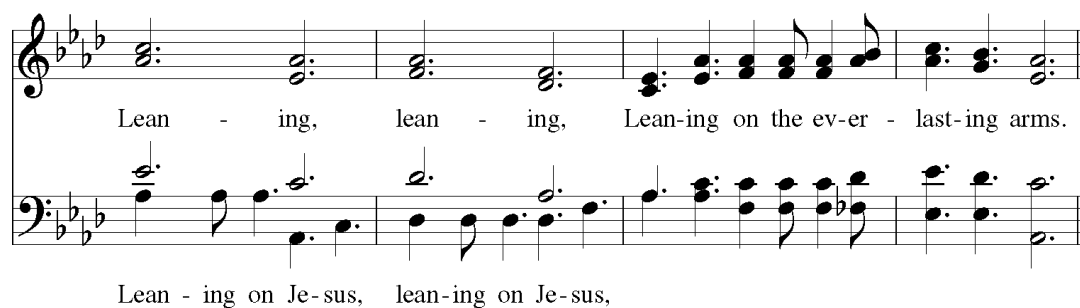

Please join us as St. Thomas' Parish undertakes the Episcopal Church's anti-racism course, **Sacred Ground**.

This powerful course is a 10-week series (with two breaks for Ash Wednesday and Holy Week) using documentaries and readings to discuss racism and faith in our nation. The Rector and Vestry urge all members of our community to participate in this important and vital dialogue on racism.



Jessie Brewster and Jason Forman will be co-facilitating the series.

The series will be held on Wednesday evenings at 6:30 pm on the Worship Zoom link and will end by 8:30 pm. The dates of the session will be February 3, 10, & 24; March 3, 10, 17, & 24; and April 7, 14, & 21.

We have had a robust series of formation events during the pandemic. Sacred Ground will be the focus of our formation events starting February 3rd, through Lent, and ending in the Easter season.

We'll be reading chapters each week in two books: **Waking Up White, and Finding Myself in the Story of Race by Deby Irving** and **Jesus and the Disinherited by Howard Thurman**
