Fifth Sunday in Lent – April 3, 2022

Welcome to St. Thomas' Parish and to the season of Lent. Your presence amongst us overflows our joy. Together, we all tell the Good News of God's love in Christ. Sing and pray with us as you are comfortable. You are welcome to fully participate in every part of this service, including Holy Eucharist (aka Lord's Supper, Holy Communion, or Mass). If you would like to learn more about St. Thomas' Parish, the Episcopal Church, or deepening your faith with us please fill out a welcome card and hand it to an usher or clergy person.

As COVID restrictions have eased around the city and the country, some members of our community have understandably been asking and wondering when the mask requirement at St. Thomas's will be lifted. Different parishes around the diocese are taking different approaches at this time, and we want to update you on our plan. Over the next few weeks, we are taking a more cautious approach in order to continue to protect vulnerable members of our community, as well as children under the age of five who still cannot be vaccinated. We also recognize that certain activities, such as singing in a congregate setting without masks, remain higher risk. In light of this, masks will be required at public worship through Easter Sunday. Our hope is that the situation will continue to improve and that after Easter Sunday we will be in a position to make masks optional during public worship. In the meantime, we are relaxing our mask policy outside of public worship. Masks will be optional in small group gatherings and social activities in the church effective immediately.

The Holy Gospel

John 12:1-8

The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" 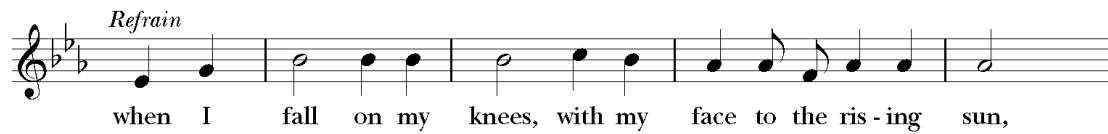
