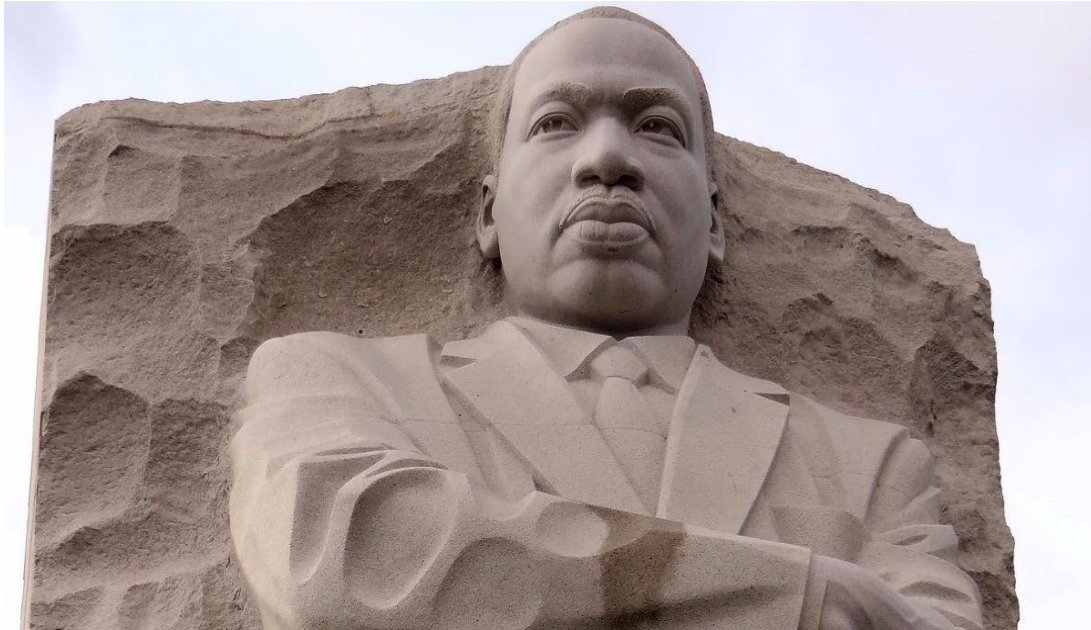

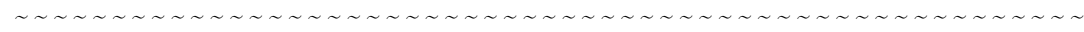

This new position expands the scope and hours of our previous administrative position and includes a focus on supporting our expanding building use. Paul has a wealth of experience developing and refining systems for finance, administration, and facility use. Additionally, he brings such warmth and hospitality, gifts we value at St. Thomas' Parish.



Paul comes to St. Thomas' from Christ Church Georgetown where he served as Director of Administration for the past 4 years. Paul and his husband, Eric Peters, reside in downtown Washington with their dog, Athena.

Christ House Volunteers Needed

Christ House opened in December 1985 as the first 24-hour residential medical facility for homeless persons in the United States. Today, Christ House is the largest facility of its kind in Washington, DC. Since their inception, they have had over 9,500 patient admissions. Patients are admitted to Christ House from area hospitals, shelters, clinics, and medical outreach projects. They suffer from a variety of illnesses and injuries including cancer, hypertension and stroke, liver disease, kidney failure, diabetes and related amputations, HIV/AIDS, respiratory disease, major lacerations, fractures, and ulcerations of the skin. Many are malnourished, anemic, depressed, and desperately disconnected from healthy sources of support.
